One of our sisters told me that some time before she entered the convent, her nine year old brother lay dying with pneumonia. His mother was weeping silently beside his bed. All of a sudden the dying boy raised himself up and said, "Mamma, you would not cry if you could see what I see; everything is so lovely." He lay back and died. His mother was consoled and resigned.
